vs closed for door which one is.

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Apr 4 2017 In the NOW Corpus nearme is 31 times more common. This is a different matter with some other position related words something can be close to me but not close to me and the same for next to proximate and so forth Jan 19 2020 The adjectives are open and closed. The door is open or is closed

Note that close can also be an adjective but with a different meaning namely the opposite of far. The door is close means the door is nearby not far away

Although spelled the same it is pronounced differently with an unvoiced s instead of voiced as in close the Apr 24 2021 0Close When used as an adjective can be used when talking about physical distances. The grocery store is close. = The grocery store is near

In this case close and near can be used in the same way and it is relatively easy to determine that close means a physical distance. As a preposition Close can only be used with the word to Jan 19 2018 Let's walk quickly because the shop closes is closing is going to close in ten minutes

These choices seem very confusing to me because they are close in the meaning. I do not know whether to say I was sitting \*\*next to by the side of beside close to\*\* my friend

As a learner all of the preparations means near or close to to me Feb 22 2020 So I said to her please always close the door behind you

I would like to have her remember this and close the door next time without my reminder close our own door to avoid disturbing each other I enter in a small bookstore the owner tells me Will you close the door please?! I enter in a small bookstore I ask the owner Shall I close the door? The two phrases above in brackets should be correct

Is it still correct common in English to say Could you close the door please?! Should I close the door? If yes what's the difference between the two? If there is any it's easy to tell what you mean but it's not correct and will sound strange to a native speaker

Typically in English we say near to or close to and far away from Apr 27 2022 In everyday speech I would use I'll close it or I'm gonna close it and reserve I'm going to close it for when I'm actually physically on my way to the door to close it just because it's long to say but either of these is natural They have slightly different implications in some contexts sit next to me implies sitting in the very next seat on one side or the other

How close that is will depend on how closely the seats are spaced however. sit beside me often implies sitting fairly close possibly touching. sit by me just

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
