It replaced the Old English letters cg which had the same sound In English j most commonly represents the affricate d. In Old English the phoneme d was represented orthographically with cg and c

Under the influence of Old French which had a similar phoneme deriving from Latin j English Dec 17 2022 I have seen multiple times that in English texts there is a dj to sound d instead of just a single j If J is at the beginning of the word

Even if those aren't native English words we already Apr 13 2021 Yes [z] + [j] []. The [j] is an alveolar sound i.e

articulated at the alveolar ridge while [j] is a palatal sound articulated at the hard palate so when [j] comes right after [z] it pulls the place of articulation of [z] towards the hard palate making it []. The technical term for this phenomenon is assimilation

In this case it's assimilation of place i.e. the place of Sep 6 2021 In all these cases you have to place the blame on the yod j sound
