And as you re addressing them directly the comma preceding ladies is necessary Ladies is the plural form of lady so the apostrophe goes to the right ladies

This seems rather a poor act of classification Jul 19 2023 Idiomatically it is gentleman. Lady comes from an Old English compound noun meaning roughly loaf kneader whereas lord comes from a compound noun meaning loaf keeper or loaf protector

The etymological counterpart of gentleman which is indeed gentlewoman is used infrequently these days usually in historical or quasi historical contexts Jul 4 2017 How did lady and ladies come to differ in conveying degree of respect? Does calling to a strange woman Hey lady! sound angry? The takeaway from those is that you should generally avoid using the singular lady as a direct form of address to a person herself as it s likely to sound confrontational

There may be some exceptions Most of the answers are missing the whole point of this question Gentleman retains connotations of respect that Lady has largely lost so is there a current conversational way of referring to a female customer that does carry those connotations more strongly than lady?
