However as a native English speaker in the US I would absolutely say it's far more common to hear 'You're welcome'. 'You're welcome' is a phrase I've said on multiple occasions but it was to stress the sincerity of the statement.

Actually saying 'you're' rather than the contraction 'you're' is unusual which is why I specifically used it to stress 'How do I look? How am I looking?'. Both are grammatical and fine to use in conversation. I use 'looking good' when I'm encouraging someone to keep doing whatever it is they're redoing.

For example 'You're looking good! The time you're responding at the gym is making a difference.' or 'You're looking good in the ring. Ali just watch out for Frazier's left hook.'
