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When you are indicating possession yours is the correct choice not yours

You do not need an apostrophe to indicate possession because yours itself is a possessive pronoun. Given that this convention is so frequent in our language, it would be normal to assume that a word such as yours would also need an apostrophe.

However, because its communication of possession is already self-contained, yours requires no punctuation. The meaning of YOURS is "that which belongs to you" used without a following noun as a pronoun equivalent in meaning to the adjective "your" often used especially with an adverbial modifier in the complimentary close of a letter. Yours is the only correct possessive form of "you" when we write it after the object in a sentence.

This is one of the most common ways to write a sentence with "you" in the possessive. Yours works by changing the second person pronoun "you" to the possessive form. Jun 13 2025 Yours is the second person possessive pronoun.

Yours with an apostrophe is a misspelling of "yours" and is always incorrect. Apr 1 2025 Yours is a possessive pronoun used to indicate something that belongs to the person being addressed. For example, in the sentence "Is this book yours?" it shows ownership.

In British English, the adverb almost invariably follows the word "yours" at the end of a letter. In most dialects of American English, it usually precedes it. The correct form is "yours" without an apostrophe.
